

Below is a list of our top 5 recommendations. Learn more about each option on their website (links below).

1. [Zoom](#)
 - a. Pricing: Has a free option that holds up to 100 people & caps meetings at 40 min. Paid plans start at \$14.99/mo
 - b. Pros: You are able to record the call & can share your screen, attendees do not need an account to join the call, can use on mobile or desktop, all tiers include HD video and HD voice
 - c. Cons: If you are on the free version and your meeting goes long (over 40 min) you will need to send out another link

2. [Join.Me](#)
 - a. Pricing: 3 plans at \$10, \$20 or \$30 per month
 - b. Pros: No time limits on any plan, you can set a url for all your meetings so it's easy for audience to remember, share your screen, high quality audio, they also have a free Whiteboard app where you can interact with members by writing / drawing on a digital white board - as if you were in a meeting in person
 - c. Cons: Lowest plan only includes 5 participants per meeting

3. [GoToMeeting](#)
 - a. Pricing: Plans start at \$12/mo
 - b. Pros: Includes link and dial-in numbers for anyone to join, all tiers include HD video, ability to screen share, video host can manager user permissions
 - c. Cons: Audio can delay if people join via dial-in rather than joining from computer

4. [Google Hangouts Meet](#)
 - a. Pricing: Already available if your company uses G-Suite
 - b. Pros: Can invite others if they don't have G-Suite, has dial-in option
 - c. Cons: Can be more laggy than others

5. [Cisco Webex](#)
 - a. Pricing: Has a free option that holds up to 100 people & caps meetings at 40 min. Paid plans start at \$13.50/mo
 - b. Pros: Easy to start the call and sign on, screen sharing, has whiteboard and sharing options
 - c. Cons: Back-end management for new users can be confusing at first
